The Choir of Men and Boys The European Adventure

The Choir of Men and Boys embark on an exciting tour to France and Italy. After three years of hard work and preparation under the direction of Scott Hanoian, the choir will sing in some of the world's most beautiful spaces, including Notre Dame Cathedral and St. Sulpice in Paris, the Duomo in Siena, and St. Peter's Basilica in Rome.



The choir and their companions will fly directly to Paris, following a celebratory Bon Voyage concert on Tuesday, July 13, at 7 pm at Christ Church. Upon arrival in the "City of Lights," the group will enjoy a city bus tour and a chance to view Paris from the heights of the Eiffel Tower. They will experience, firsthand, some of the most legendary pieces of art in the immense Musée du Louvre and Musée d'Orsay. Their musical journey will commence at inspiring Notre Dame Cathedral with a Saturday evening Mass. That first Sunday, the choir will lead a morning service at the American Cathedral, and perform an afternoon concert at St. Sulpice.

This busy weekend in Paris is followed by a few days of travel and tours south through Tuscany before heading on to Rome. Their musical progress in Italy begins with a morning service at Siena's Duomo – whose striped marble columns and sculptural masterpieces make it one of the most iconic cathedrals in Italy. They will make picturesque detours to appreciate the Tuscan countryside to Orvieto and Spannocchia before arriving in Florence. While in this historically and artistically dense city, they will encounter stunning paintings, sculptures and architecture throughout the city and in the Galleria dell'Accademia.

Reflecting on a triumphant program year

This year, we are lucky enough to welcome 11 choristers to the choir, while only saying goodbye to two graduating seniors. Numbers like this inch us closer and closer to our goal of 20 girl choristers and 20 boy choristers, and I am very pleased that the tireless recruiting efforts of our choir parents and parishioners have started to pay off. Daughters of the King

"With heart, mind and spirit, uphold and bear the cross."

When a family at Christ Church welcomed four new children to their home almost overnight, Daughters of the King (DOK) prepared meals for them and helped care for the children during the transition. When a parishioner's mother passed away early this year, DOK was there to offer comfort and encouragement.

"That's what we're about," said Jean Redfield, a Daughter for 10 years. "We're pretty active in pastoral care and quick to respond to those in need."

Founded by Margaret Franklin in 1885 in New York City, DOK is an international lay religious order for women in the Episcopal Church with affiliate chapters in the Anglican, Roman Catholic and Lutheran Churches. Each member undertakes a Rule of Life, pledging herself to a lifelong program of prayer, service and evangelism.

Members of the St. Monnica Chapter at Christ Church are involved in all aspects of the work of the parish — as chalice bearers, lectors, members of the Vestry and Altar Guild, Sunday school teachers, ushers and choir members. You'll find members assisting at healing services, teaching or attending Bible classes and sponsoring Quiet Days.

In addition to their private daily prayer times, the Daughters meet together on the first Monday of the month for large and small group prayer and Bible study. They recently started a daytime group on the third Tuesday of the month.

"We encourage each other, we learn from each other, we engage in acts of service together, we challenge each other and hold each other accountable to our vows," said Martha Williams, newly appointed president of DOK. "I take great comfort in knowing we are there for each other in prayer and presence when our faith is challenged and the road of life's journey gets rough."

The Daughters wear DOK's emblem at all times — a small silver Greek cross with a Latin inscription which means, "with heart, mind and spirit, uphold and bear the cross."

Wendy Niven became a Daughter as a result of her curiosity with the emblem. Captivated by the crosses she saw on so many women at CCGP who seemed involved with each other and the larger community, she inquired and was encouraged to learn more about the order and to join.

"Membership in the Daughters has broadened my horizons, spiritually, as well as practically. I am awed by the power of prayer and the openness of my sisters to the Holy Spirit and each other," said Wendy.

Martha Williams said the benefits to the parish of having a DOK chapter at CCGP are immeasurable.

"As Fr. David Dieter has expressed on more than one occasion, and I fully agree, the Daughters do 'deep prayer work that is not necessarily highly visible, but has a significant impact on the spiritual health of the parish,'" said Martha.

Extraordinarily Ordinary

The term “ordinary time” is used to describe the parts of the liturgical year that are not associated with the major church seasons. Ordinary Time includes the Monday after the Feast of the Baptism of our Lord through the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday, and the Monday after Pentecost through the Saturday before the first Sunday of Advent. May 24, the Monday after the Feast of Pentecost, began our next period of Ordinary Time.



Our prayer book refers to Ordinary Time as the Season after Pentecost. The liturgical color for this stretch of time is green, therefore this period is often called the “green season.” In most parts of the western world, the green season is simultaneous with the growing season, so the growth and development of God’s creation is interwoven with liturgical praxis.

Ordinary Time can also be a time of extraordinary spiritual growth and development because it can be in the ordinary times of our lives that God can be consistently present to us. It is in the ordinary times that we often are confronted with the reality of living the daily life of resurrection and abundance that Christ has given us.

Although this Ordinary Time of 2010 is anything but “regular” for us at Christ Church, it is testing the point that we can find new ways to love and grow and discover creative ways to reconcile ourselves to God and each other in the season of green.

Christ Church is a charter member of Habitat Grosse Pointe Partners, which is devoted to supporting Habitat for Humanity–Detroit through fundraising and volunteerism. Every summer there is a Blitz Build, allowing for a number of homes to be worked on simultaneously for a few weeks, with the goal of occupancy by the end of the Blitz Build.

Phase One of this year’s Blitz Build, “Building on Faith,” was held June 14-19; Phase Two is scheduled for July 6-10. Volunteers are needed to do/learn construction activities, or “table” jobs (to serve meals, register people, etc.). Volunteers are only asked to do tasks with which they are comfortable, and instruction is given upon request. All tools are provided (unless volunteers prefer to use their own), as well as breakfast and lunch, and bottled water as needed. The location is on Maryland, just across Mack from Grosse Pointe. Guild of the Christ Child Ministering to those preparing for baptism

Guild of the Christ Child (GCC) is a ministry program that provides support to individuals and families who are planning a Baptism at Christ Church. A branch of the national Guild of the Christ Child, this ministry has served at Christ Church for years with the continued support of parishioners.

"The parents are generally not members," said Meredith Hanoian, a GCC member for two years. "Their parents may have been baptized here, they may have been baptized here, and so their children must be baptized here. It's a good thing Christ Church is open to people who don't have a home church, but want to baptize their child."

Meredith said GCC members help the families by attending the rehearsal with them and being there on the day of the baptism, because they're not always familiar with the order of the service.

"It's rewarding to get to know the people and be present for the next step in their lives. It's a big deal, the welcoming into the church," Meredith said.



In addition to being with the families on the day of the baptism, GCC members meet at the church four to seven times a year to make felt banners "as a token to help honor and remember the candidates' baptism," said GCC member Liz Johnson. "Being a member of the group is not a huge time commitment, which is nice if you are a busy parent, like myself and many others."

Group members bring their own sewing machines and hot glue guns to fashion the banners with the child's name, an image of a dove and water droplets. Each is trimmed in the color of the liturgical season in which the baptism takes place.

Meredith added that the group provides a bag of information to each family, including the baptism candle, the shell used to pour the water over the candidate, certificates for godparents, and information about the church in case they want to get involved.

Liz said, "Every baptism is memorable, but I really enjoyed it one Easter when an entire family and their young children were baptized. It was nice getting to know their family better and feel a special connection with them."
